

# How to Earn a B.A. in Chinese Studies

A student needs to earn a passing grade in the following: Minimum of 2 years of Chinese language course (or equivalent ability), HILD 10-11-12 (or equivalent), & complete a total of 12 upper-division courses whose content relates primarily to Chinese Studies.

There is a Pre-Approved List in the UCSD General Catalog to choose courses from. There are courses that are applicable via approved Student Petition; this process also pertains to EAP/OAP too. Speak with the Chinese Studies Program Coordinator for more information.

## SPECIAL CRITERIA:

- All upper & lower-division courses must be taken for a letter grade.
- A maximum of 6 of the upper-division courses may be language acquisition courses.
- Take a combination of courses from 3 different departments that offer Chinese Studies topics (Example: HIEA, LTEA & CHIN or HIEA, VIS & POLI).
- 1 of the courses MUST be categorized as a colloquium, in which the student writes a substantial term paper. These courses are usually numbered HIEA 161 through 171.
- Only 6 upper-division courses can be accepted from a school other than UCSD.
  - A maximum of 3 of those courses may be language acquisition from another college or through an EAP/OAP study abroad program.
- EAP/OAP or courses not on the Pre-Approved Course List need to be petitioned & the approved by the Director. You will need to submit evidence such as a syllabus, textbook, notes, final papers, coursework, tests and/or final grades to help back your claim that said course is acceptable as an upper-division Chinese Studies course.
